


DETERMINERS, PRONOUNS & QUANTIFIERS

Determiners = words we use before nouns to:

- a) identify which people or things we are talking about
- b) talk about the quantities or amounts

examples: all, any, both, each, every, many, more, neither, several, that, this, those...

I'll have **some** toast with **a little** jam on it, please. 

Very **few** records remain of **this** period.

Special notes:


- each, every, neither, and either are followed by a singular noun and a singular verb
- Neither side is prepared to give way on this issue.**

We use for all + noun to mean despite.

For all the company's talk of equal opportunities, there are no women in management positions.


Pronouns = replace nouns when the noun is known

We can use most of the above determiners on their own as pronouns.

"Do you want jam on your toast?" "Just **a little**, please." 

Quantifiers = say how much or how many there are of who or what we are talking about

We can also use the pronouns as quantifiers:

- before of + object pronoun
- He ate **both of them**. 
- before of + the, this, that, these, those, my, your, etc. + noun
- Most of her friends** were there.

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
